KEN V. SPICER JUNE 29, 1903 - SEPTEMBER 24, 1983

It is with great sorrow that we report the loss of a dedicated Live Steamer, and good friend, Kenneth V. Spicer. Almost 30 years before our Club, had it's start Ken was working on his Mikado which is still running today. As one of the founding members of the Sacramento Valley Live Steamers, he erected a temporary track in his backyard to permit other members of the newly formed Club to operate his locomotive. The operation of this locomotive back and forth on approximately 40 feet of track provided a real motivation to have a Club track, hence the present location of the Sacramento Valley Live Steamers in the Cordova Community Park. For many years Ken and his Mikado ("Old Faithful") provided the mainstay of passenger operation on our railroad. Unfortunately, poor health prevented Ken from doing as much railroading as he would have liked during the last few years, but friend and stranger alike were eagerly treated to glowing descriptions of the Live Steam Hobby and our Club. Among Ken's most treasured possessions was the only engraved brass Life Membership Card ever presented by the Sacramento Valley Live Steamers. Ken will be fondly remembered at the throttle of "Old Faithful" steaming through Cordova Community Park.

FROM THE CAB - (President's Comments)

I am sure that almost everyone realizes the very important position that a locomotive holds in it's owner's heart. With this realization in mind, and because of the respect for these feelings, very few people would have the intestional fortitude to walk up and ask permission to touch someone's locomotive, much less ever dream of asking to run it. This may at times account for what appears to be a lack of interest in a piece of equipment. If the truth were known this casual observer of your locomotive may really be turning inside out hoping that you will say, "Would you like to learn how she operates". Several locomotive owners have mentioned to me that at times they would just like to sit in the station and enjoy the sights and sounds of their locomotive passing by. Or that they wish someone else could run it while they stopped for a cool drink or a sandwich. Have you considered the group of members that work so hard keeping the track and grounds in shape? In many cases, these members do not own equipment of their own and would be thrilled beyond words for a chance to run an engine. No one would ever be condemned for feeling uncomfortable turning his pride and joy over to a novice. If on the otherhand, you could teach someone enough about your equipment that you would feel confident in their ability to operate it, you too could step back and enjoy your treasure passing by. At the same time you will have done much to increase the overall pleasure of the live Steam Hobby.

DID YOU KNOW?

Q. How is the engineer enabled to see ahead of the engine, on the track, at night?

A. By a head-light of about 40 to 75 candle-power placed in front on a bracket having a parabolic mirror by which its rays may be directed in a practically parallel beam striking the track in an elliptical area at some distance ahead of the engine.


First Class Sections - Passenger may complain to crew.
