NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Nominating Committee has been put in place. The members are Gordon Moser, Chairman, Milon Thorley, and Jack Friedman. They are already moving to come up with their suggested slate for the positions of Vice President, Treasurer, Track Superintendent, and Yard Master. The nominees will be announced at the October General Membership Meeting. If members have a candidate who is not on the suggested list, nominees can be made from the floor at the October Meeting. A second to the nomination and confirmation either in writing or in person that the nomination will be accepted is required.

CONSTRUCTION GROUP

For some time we have had plans to form a group of members who want to participate in the construction of a project for SVLSRM. The intention was to build an engine at first, and plans were being developed with Al Shelley. When Al passed away unexpectedly, the group was on hold for lack of a project. We are starting the group again now, and several folks have come forward to work on the new riding cars for public passenger use. The plan has been developed by Pete Arney with the help of Bill Yoder and others. Pete and I went to a steel supply company to acquire 1 x 2 steel tubing needed. After this trip, Milon Thorley, Pete Arney, Richard Lutrel, Bill Yoder, and I got together for a day of cutting, and all of the steel was cut to proper length for welding. That welding will follow shortly. When this project is done, we will have six cars toward our goal of twelve. If you would like to be involved in this or our next project, let Pete or me know. Also, let us know the type of skill you would like to use or learn. This is a great way to actively get involved. Also, at our September meeting on the 15th we will have, as a program feature, an explanation of the car assembly. The cut pieces, the plans and the prototype car will be there for your inspection. We will have all the parts and plans for you to see. If you come, you may be encouraged to build your own car.

Concurrent with the riding car start, the Construction Group is developing plans a new steam engine for SVLSRM use. Now is the time to get involved as things are getting moving.

OTHER THINGS

A joint meet is being held Sunday, September 10th at SVLSRM with the Garden Railway Club. This is their event and picnic and we are invited to participate by running our engines and having hot dogs with their members. Come out and join this two-group fellowship.

Halloween Scary U trains will run on October 28, 30 & 31. Jerry Jewell and his theater group will have their haunted house up and running and we will run our trains to carry visitors to the venue. This is lots of fun for us and works to provide funds for our insurance. Again, an opportunity to run a train and help SVLSRM.

Plan to attend the Roseville International Railfair at the fairgrounds in Roseville November 11 & 12, 2006. We will be participating with our snap track and engines. We need volunteers and this is a special time for us all (and a pass is included for all who help). Let me know if you want to be on the list. Some time ago, members approved the expenditure for tie material as a part of track realignment in the station area. Shortly we expect delivery of the material which was ordered months ago from Canada. This is a major undertaking but will significantly improve the track around the trees.

SAFETY RULES FOR THE MONTH

103. Public passengers shall be carried only on 7 1/2" gauge equipment approved, by the Safety Committee.

208. Any train that is stopped on the mainline, must call out a flagman to protect to the rear with a red flag or light that may be clearly seen by a following engineer for a distance of at least one-hundred fifty (150) feet.

304. ENGINEERS:

A. Qualifications: any member of S.V.L.S. or other Live Steam club, who demonstrates they has the knowledge, judgment, and ability to operate a locomotive and who passes the qualification test, will be qualified to operate as engineer on the type of locomotive for which he has applied (steam, electric, etc.) No one under the age of 18 will act as engineer on any train pulling the general public. Persons between the ages of 13-17 may operate as engineer of the locomotive only with permission of the owner, or in the case of S.V.L.S. owned equipment, by permission of the Trainmaster. They will not carry passengers except a flagman. Children under the age of 12 may operate locomotives only while accompanied by an adult (the owner or another adult who is familiar with and qualified to operate said locomotive). The adult must sit directly behind the child and have full access to and can easily reach the controls in case of emergency. Children under 12 years of age may operate trains in the above mentioned manner with passengers who are live steam club members or family members. Children under age 12 may operate non-steam locomotives such as small electric or gas powered engines with simple controls without an adult supervisor as long as they do not carry passengers except for a flagman. Engineers under 18, at the discretion of the Trainmaster or his designated alternate, may be restricted from operating during periods of heavy traffic such as during invitational meets, birthday party runs, and major holidays such as 4th of July.

B. Responsibilities: the engineer is responsible for the safe handling of the train and the cars at all times. He must be in close cooperation with all other operating personnel, observing all rules and signals (whistles, hand, flag or light) given by the trainmen and stationmaster. He must run his engine in conformance with club safety rules at all times. He must see that any club equipment used by him is returned to its proper storage space at the end of his run, unless another engineer takes over the responsibility of such equipment and agrees to see that such equipment is properly stored after its use.

414. All locomotives shall be equipped with a whistle, horn, or sounding device for sounding locomotive signals. Such sounding device be powerful enough to be heard distinctly for at least 150 feet.


